Follow-up care recommendations For children and adolescents prescribed ADHD medications

American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) guidelines² – Children and adolescents on newly prescribed ADHD medications should have follow-up care with a prescribing provider **within 2 weeks.**

HEDIS® guidelines¹ - Schedule follow-up appointments as follows:

- First follow-up **within 30 days** from the initial prescription date with a provider who has prescribing authority
- At least 2 more follow-up appointments with any practitioner over the next 9 months

Why timely follow-up matters

Follow-up within 30 days of starting medication is critical for monitoring medication efficacy, side effects and adherence.¹⁻²

Best practices for patient follow-up

- Schedule follow-up appointments before your patients leave the office³
- Ensure all practice providers and office staff are aware of timely follow-up requirements
- Label appointment slots as "initial medication checks" to help prioritize scheduling
- Have Advanced Practice Registered Nurses conduct the follow-up visits
- Use home monitoring tools (e.g., blood pressure cuffs, smart scales and wearables)
- Train parents to record and report vitals during virtual visits
- Offer nurse-led vitals checks at local clinics or pharmacies
- Schedule hybrid visits combining brief in-person vitals with virtual consultations
- Combine behavioral therapy with medication to enhance attention, reduce impulsive behavior and minimize side effects and dosage needed
